Vista's User Account Control (UAC)


As part of its improved security system, Microsoft added a feature that enables you to log in as a regular user without administrator privileges, but quickly elevates your privileges when a program needs greater access. According to the Windows Secrets e-mail newsletter of 3-8-07 (http://WindowsSecrets.com/comp/070308), it is a good thing even though you may get frequent prompts asking if you approve when a new program tries to open or download from the Internet. While I agree with their assessment that disabling this feature is not wise, it sure can be a pain.

Recover Deleted Files

If you inadvertently deleted an important file, you may or may not be able to recover it, depending on how soon you discover it. Back Up Your Essential PC Drivers

There are several free software programs that will make copies of your hardware drivers, so that in the event you need to replace a corrupted file, you can easily do so. One such program is Driver Collector. It finds and collects the installed driver files for the hardware you select on your PC. Pandora – a Free Music Resource

The Internet is filled with free resources, but some are better than others. Here is one of the best free music resources on the Web.

Pandora is one of my favorite music websites. Just surf over to www.pandora.com and type in a song or an artist that you like. Pandora analyses your choice and creates a music station with similar-sounding music. It will then play comparable songs that it thinks you will like. You can add more music and/or artists to the station to refine your choices. You can also tell Pandora whether or not you like the song that is playing. It uses your likes and dislikes to refine the songs it chooses. You can create up to 100 different stations with different types of music.

Pandora was created by the Music Genome Project, a group of musicians and music-loving technologists who have broken music into hundreds of music attributes or "genes" such as melody, harmony, rhythm, instrumentation, orchestration, arrangement, lyrics, and harmony. They then use high-tech methodology to analyze the musical qualities of each song and rendition.

The results are uncanny. I created several music stations with different

THINGS, THINGLETS & THINGASSOS

KEEPING TRACK OF MULTIPLE PASSWORDS

Passwords are a part of our everyday life: we use them for email, online banking, stock trading, shopping, blogging, etc. For good security, you should have a different password for each website you enter. But how can you remember so many passwords? A password manager is a great way to consolidate all your passwords without compromising security. Generally, a password manager is a program that stores all of your passwords for you. All of your passwords are kept secure with—you guessed it—a password.

The key advantage to using a password manager is that you only have to remember one password. That's not too bad. Then you can retain unique passwords for each of your various accounts without taxing your memory.

There are several pay programs that work this way. Before buying one, try KeePass (http://keepass.sourceforge.net/), a simple, free password manager. It can help you organize your passwords and also enter them into log-in forms.

How does KeePass work? After you download and install it, there are several easy steps to setting it up. The first time you open it, you have to create the file that will store your passwords. Click the "New" button at the top left of the window which will prompt you for a "Master Key." Make it one that you can easily remember, but which someone else can't easily guess (e.g., your birth date, your spouse/child's/pet's name), because it's the password you'll use from now on to unlock all your other passwords.

KeePass includes categories for online functions such as e-mail, home banking and others. To put a password into KeePass, select a category and then click the "Add Entry" button. You'll be able to enter a title for the password, which will help you easily identify where the password is used.

Let's take Hotmail as an example—an effective title for a Hotmail password could be simply "Hotmail." You could also enter the web address where the password is required. KeePass automatically fills the password box with a random password. Chances are that it's stronger than the password you already use for Hotmail, but to make it work, you have to log into your account and change it to match KeePass.

If you want to keep things simple, erase the pre-filled box and put in the password that you already use and click "OK". Do the same steps for all of your everyday passwords and take a load off your memory. You can drag and drop passwords directly from KeePass. Click the password you need from KeePass and move it to the blank form on a Web page. The password will appear in the blank.

KeePass keeps your entire password file encrypted. The only way to open or read it is with your master password, so don't lose it!

In addition to Windows, "switch-hitters" can download versions of KeePass for Macintosh, PocketPC, Palm and Linux. You can also take KeePass with you on a thumb drive by copying two files onto your thumb drive. One is the KeePass program (KeePass.exe), and the other is the file containing your passwords (the default is called Database.kdb).

BACKING UP OUTLOOK CONTACTS

Outlook stores all data in a single file called a ".PST file". This file contains your contacts, e-mail, calendar items and tasks. It's easy to back up your entire Outlook .PST file—just locate it and copy it as you would any other file. Backing up individual folders within Outlook is also easy, so you can export your entire "Contacts" list. Simply highlight "Contacts" in your Outlook folders list. Then click "File," and "Import and Export" to open the "Import and Export Wizard." Select "Export to a file" and click "Next," to choose from a list of options (I recommend Microsoft Excel as the best one to choose in order to export all your contacts into a nicely ordered spreadsheet). After making your selection, click "Next." You'll be given the option again to select the folder you want to export. Highlight it, click "Next," and specify the name and location where you would like to save your file (use the "Browse" button if needed), click "Next" and then click "Finish."

You can use the same procedure with other items in the Outlook folder list. This is handy if you only want to export certain parts of your Outlook data file. You can use the files with other programs such as a "Database." You can also use it to share information with other people. Say you want to share your contacts with friends or coworkers: just export them, and others can import your list into their Outlook program.

To import a file, click "File," and "Import and Export." Select "Import from another program or file," click "Next," and select the type of file from which you're importing. In this case, select "Microsoft Excel" and click "Next." Click "Browse" to locate the file you wish to import, and then select your import options. You may want to allow duplicates, or you may wish to replace duplicates with imported items. You can also specify that duplicates not be imported. Click "Next," select the destination folder, click "Next" again, and finally, click "Finish."

NOVICE CORNER

Starting Your Computer in "Safe Mode" - At some point in time you may need to start your computer in "safe mode." You should print these instructions before continuing as they will not be available after you shut your computer down in step two. Click "Start," click "Shut Down," and then in the drop-down list click "Shut down." In the shut down window dialog box, click "Restart," and then click "OK." When you see the message "Please select the operating system to start" or "Windows" appears on the screen, press the "F8" key several times. Use your arrow keys to highlight the appropriate "safe mode" option, and then press "ENTER." If you have a dual-boot or multiple-boot system, choose the installation that you need to access using the arrow keys, and then press "ENTER."

genres that I like and in almost every case I was presented with similar music that I found very pleasing. You can experiment with different combinations. For instance, putting James Taylor and Willie Nelson together gave me an interesting, but likable mix of music.

Pandora is pretty smart. Typing in The Christmas Song and choosing Diana Krall as the artist gave me a whole station of mellow Christmas music which is just what I was looking for. Typing in The Nylons and Take 6 gave me a nice selection of acappella and harmonistic music.

Pandora also lets you bookmark songs or artists so you can remember what you liked. You can look up more information about artists and songs right on the site. Two clicks will lead you to iTunes or Amazon where you can purchase the music. You can also share your music by emailing your stations to friends.

Pandora is ad-supported so you will see ads for everything from gym shoes to cell service. I found the ads to be unobtrusive, but if you want to get rid of them, you can pay to eliminate them. For \$36, you get 12 months of unlimited use with services exactly the same as the free version, but without the ads.

Since the ads don't bother me, I'll continue to use the free version of Pandora. It's an entertaining website that provides much listening pleasure to keep me company when I am working on the computer.

If you are into music, you may also want to check out two other music resources. MusicIP Mixer and Goombah. Like Pandora, both of these sites provide intriguing music adventures.

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Microsoft Vista Ultimate and Acer Ferrari 1004 First Look

The new Vista operating system has been a long time in coming. As part of the lengthy beta test program (that I participated in), Microsoft even involved 50 fami-



lies from around the world who gave daily feedback using a Microsoft-provided computer (according to a 1-30-07 article in the Los Angeles Times). And, its introduction to home and small business users has been promoted by a major marketing campaign that includes both Vista and the new Office 2007 suite. As part of this effort, Microsoft provided quite a few fully loaded review laptops (with Vista Ultimate and Office 2007 pre-installed) to bloggers and some user group activists (of whom I was one). You can find numerous blogger and blog reader commentaries and reviews on the Internet (on the promotional effort, software, & hardware) as well as the usual assortment of articles from regular reviewers covering a wide spectrum of views as befits a major software release. My review, obviously, doesn't cover all of Vista's features and leaves a discussion of Office 2007 to a subsequent review. I do plan to write more on Vista as I gain additional experience in its use. Hopefully, I have provided enough useful information here to aid your nearterm buying decision.

Hardware

The machine that I received (courtesy of Windows Vista and AMD according to Microsoft) is an Acer Ferrari 1004 WTMi ultra-portable laptop with a high-tech carbon-fiber casing, a 12.1-inch WXGA screen (1280x800 max. resolution), an AMD Turion 64x2 Mobile Technology TL-56 dual processor, an ATI Radeon Xpress 1150 chipset, 1.8 GB of DDR2 SDRAM, a 160 GB Hitachi SATA hard drive, 5-in-1 card reader, an external IEEE 1394 8x CD-ROM drive, an integrated rotate-able Acer OrbiCam camera, Realtek high-definition



built-in stereo speakers, 802.11n WLAN Bluetooth, Bluetooth VoIP phone, gigabit Ethernet port, V.92 modem, a compact keyboard with a built-in Touchpad plus an Acer optical mouse, and both 6-cell (5200 mAh) and 3-cell (2000 mAh) Li-Ion battery packs, the former one good for only about 4 hours of operation before recharging and the latter less than 2 hour, depending on settings. The laptop weighs a mere 3.85 lbs. with the larger battery pack. Finally, the

laptop and external drive come with nice carrying cases. Wow! Of note, PC Magazine (10-31-06 issue) rated the Ferrari a 3.5 (on a scale of 1-5) and CNET rated it a 6.1 (out of 10). Good, but obviously not the best.

Surprisingly, the graphics card has a "Windows Experience" score of only 2.8 whereas 3.0 is supposed to be the minimum to achieve the full effect of Vista's new graphical "Aero" look and capabilities. However, I have not been able to detect any degradation of appearance or video or other capabilities in my usage so far. The Windows Experience Index, new to Vista, rates five components (Processor, RAM, Graphics, Games, & Primary Hard Drive) with scores from 1 to 5.9. The overall score is the lowest of the five.

In my view, the Acer laptop is good-looking and stylish as befitting the Ferrari hot-car namesake, but expensive at about \$2300 list. There is a 1-year manufacturer's warranty. Although small in size, I found the keyboard easy to use even though I've only used full-size ones before. The touchpad is "interesting" but I prefer using the faster optical mouse for most inputs. Performing tasks with the AMD processor was much faster than I expected (at least compared to my Dell 8400 desktop). The external optical drive works fine, but is a bit of a nuisance if space is limited. And, you still have to carry it around when traveling unless you're not using CDs/DVDs at that time. The larger Ferrari 5000 model has a built-in drive which I think is more practical, at least it would be for me. There is a 61-page printed User's Guide which covers the essentials, but it is all too brief if this is your first laptop. If you have a hardware problem, don't count on much help from Acer Tech Support. I tried several (free) telephone calls when I got the laptop in late December and was informed via a recording that they were swamped and there would be at least an hour wait. I also sent an e-mail request for help and it took 5 days to get a reply! Maybe response time is better now?

Operating System

The review system includes the 64-bit top-of-the-line Vista Ultimate. Other available Vista operating systems are Home Basic, Home Premium, Business, and Enterprise for both 32-bit and 64-bit computers. (There also is a Vista Starter operating system for inexpensive PCs used in emerging-market countries.) Home Basic is the most limited in capabilities and doesn't have the aero look. The Microsoft table below lists the key features of four versions. A more detailed comparison of all versions can be found in the electronic Product Guide starting on p. 18 (see Vista Help below).

Requirements for All Vistas except Basic

Microsoft recommends these component capabilities for the operating system:

- 1 GHz 32-bit (x86) or 64-bit (x64) processor and 1 GB system memory.
 - 40 GB hard drive with at least 15 GB free space.
- Support for Direct X9 on graphics card (WDDM driver, 128 MB or more of graphics RAM, Pixel Shader 2.0, and 32 bits per pixel).
 - DVD-ROM drive (internal or external).
 - Audio output and Internet access.

Installation

I cannot speak to the installation of Vista Ultimate since it came pre-installed (by Microsoft) on the Acer Ferrari laptop. But, from what I've read in books and on the Internet, most people are unlikely to experience serious problems whether doing a clean installation on a new machine (or a partition separate from your existing operating system), or upgrade by having Vista replace Windows XP or an older OS. **This assumes, of course, that your computer has the capability to run OK with Vista.** If you want to check before buying Vista, you can download a free Microsoft tool from: www.windows vista.com/upgradeadvisor (also see). When I participated in the beta test program, I installed without problems three beta versions on new partitions that I created on my main desktop PC (a two-year-old Dell 8400, 3.2 GHz Pentium 4, 1 GB RAM, two large hard drives, and the Windows XP HE OS).

One of the biggest problems that I encountered with Vista's beta versions was incompatibility with many of my existing programs. But, with Vista Ultimate on the Acer laptop, surprisingly, most of the programs that I added worked well. Since, Microsoft pre-installed the Office 2007 suite, I did not try my older versions of Office. However, here's a sampling of what works: Adobe Acrobat Pro v.7, Adobe Reader 8, ScanSoft PDF Pro 4, Quicken Premiere 2007, TurboTax Deluxe 2006, Print-

shop Deluxe v.22, RoboForm, SnagIt, Belarc Advisor, LapLink Gold 12, and Microsoft Streets & Trips 2007 (without GPS Navigator which doesn't have a driver yet for a Vista 64-bit OS). I also tried Partition Magic 8, but it is incompatible with Vista as were several old knowledge reference programs. Microsoft has a Windows Marketplace web site with links to 1000s of software and hardware products that are said to work with Vista (www.windowsmarketplace.com/PWT.mc_id=0806252).

Running the Laptop with Vista

Since I don't have a wireless setup with my PCs, I used a cable connection from the Acer to my router and was able to interconnect the two desktops and laptop by setting up a home network. (I use Time-Warner Cable to connect all three machines to the Internet via the router.) Everything has worked fine so far with the initial exception of Internet Explorer 7. It was unable to access any web sites until I discovered that there were two entries in the Start/All Programs list, one for the 64-bit version of IE 7 and the other for the 32-bit one. And, the default setting was incorrectly set for 32-bits. After making the switch, IE 7 opened fine! Before I discovered the real problem, I went off on a wild goose chase to no avail where I tried such options as resetting IE 7 to its original (when installed) setting and turning off IE add-ons, Protected Mode, and other security settings. Incidentally, the new Protected Mode feature is intended to protect your computer from those hackers intent on delivering malware or damaging files via your browser. (As I understand it, PM prevents execution of code without your approval.)

I also exercised the 5-in-1 built-in reader card using a memory card from my digital camera to transfer photos to the laptop's hard drive via Windows Photo Gallery. No sweat. I tried three methods to transfer files to the laptop. First, I used a San Disk USB memory stick that I plugged into one of the three built-in USB ports after copying files to it from a desktop. Then, I tried using the Acer external optical drive with data copied to a CD. Finally, I used my network to directly copy files from a desktop to the laptop. All methods worked without a hitch.

Microsoft has a new version (2007) of its free Virtual PC software (http://www.microsoft.com/windows/products/winfa mily/virtualpc/default.mspx) that I downloaded and installed. (A Virtual PC allows you to simultaneously run multiple operating systems on a single machine.) Then I added Windows XP Pro as the operating system. One of its great features is that you can install and run programs that you use which are incompatible with Vista as well as access the Internet, and retrieve your mail. I previously tried this on my desktop and it works well, acting as if it were a separate partition, but without having to shut down Vista and reboot.


I tried some of the media features of Vista and was pleased with the results. I set *Windows Media Player 11* as the default audio program and played a number of my albums using both the built-in Acer stereo speakers and a stereo headset connected to the audio output jack. I also ripped several CD music albums to the hard drive using WMP. There is a lot more capability for me to explore in the future. The new *Photo Gallery* allows you

Roxio-Sonic Backup MyPC Deluxe v. 6

There are two kinds of PC users: those who backup their work regularly and those who will wish they had. Think of all the ways you can lose all that precious data on your hard drive - power failure, hard disk failure, inadvertent reformatting, virus attacks, magnetic fields, etc. All magnetic data media including hard disks, floppies, and CDs will not retain



data indefinitely. Regular backups are the only way to avoid losing that piece of work you invariably need just at the very time you lose it. Either we backup our work regularly or we eventually lose it. So what is the easiest most unobtrusive way to get backing up done on a regular basis?

The Roxio-Sonic Backup MyPC Deluxe v6.0 program can ensure that easy regular backup for you. The program comes with many features that make life simpler for us PC users. For example, the program allows one to schedule regular background backups while you are working. It also does full, incremental, or differential backups. It can then compare what's been backed up with the original files that were backed up to ensure saved data integrity. Its catalog feature allows locating and restoring various versions of the same data set, if needed. The backed up files can be compressed and/or password-protected if necessary. And, the backed up files can be sent to a multitude of media - CD, DVD, Dual layer DVD, tape, network server, or external HD. Perhaps most important, by storing both data and operating system, a quick disaster recovery capability for your PC is possible.

I found a couple of Backup MyPC features that are especially helpful. For example, if you are a busy compute user who wants to spend minimum time learning to use new software such as this backup program, then you will like the seven wizards provided for doing not only backups, but also creating disk labels, erasing disks, finalizing a disk to prevent additional data being added, as well as initiating the various methods of backing up data, photos, music, etc.

My first backup of 100 Mb using Backup MyPC took just six minutes. Comparison of the files backed up to the original hard disk files took only seconds. The procedure was easy. First, open MyPC Deluxe and click on Backup. Select Backup again over either Restore or Compare. Next, select the files to be backed up. Then give your backup file a name, preferably using the suggested MM/DD/YY BACKUP format. Decide if you must back up all the selected files or want just incremen-

tal or differential backups of the files. Then hit Start. That's it - quick and easy.

Version 6 of the Roxio-Sonic Deluxe Backup MyPC Suite has a new user interface that integrates a number of functions other than just backing up files such as making exact copies of disks, burning hard drive images onto disks, etc. One interesting capability is Archiving using Backup MyPC where a user can check types of files to be archived, as opposed to checking all specific files for backup.

Roxio Sonic Backup MyPC has been designed especially as an easy-to-use program. For the casual PC users, that is important because they are most likely not to make a concerted effort to back up their work until it is too late to rescue that all important document! Such problems can be precluded with scheduled backups using Backup MyPC. The program is available at www.roxio.com/enu/store/backup.html for \$49.99. Amazon presently has it for as low as \$42.49. This review was made with Windows XP PC having a 2.5GHz CPU, 120 GB HD, flat panel monitor, broadband cable Internet, two CD/DVD drives, and laser and inkjet printers.

Windows Vista – The Missing Manual

Now that Microsoft has finally released all five (or is it 10?) of its versions of the Vista operating system, the book publishers have rushed to get their entries to market as well. This one, from O'Reilly, is part of *The Missing Manual* series and was written by well-known author and technology columnist, David Pogue. It is big (over 825 pages) and covers most everything you need to know whether you



are a novice or "budding power user." The author does a commendable job of highlighting information aimed at newbies (Up to Speed Sidebars) and advanced users (Power Users' Clinic Boxes). He also indicates what features can be found in which version of Vista.

Pogue's style of writing makes for easy reading and understanding with enough humor to keep you interested. The book is well-illustrated, but unfortunately, there are no color graphics, even for the "Aero look" which loses much when viewed in black-and-white. And you can read it "cover-to-cover" or just look at the chapters of interest, except perhaps for the introductory material.

The book is divided into seven parts with several chapters each. It starts with the Vista Desktop (everything that you see on the screen), then covers software use, doing the Internet, multimedia stuff, hardware questions, backing up files and trouble-shooting (do they go together?), and finally, running Vista in a network (a particularly important area for many of us today).

Unfortunately, there isn't too much information on problems and fixes (maybe that warrants a special book?). For that you have to rely mostly on the various community web sites where people post questions and hopefully get useful answers or talk to a guru from your computer club. Of course, you could try Microsoft Tech Support (which costs), but you are most likely to wind up dealing with someone overseas and a difficult-to-understand accent. As an example, I had a problem with getting Internet Explorer 7 to work and the book wasn't much help although one Web site did have a related question. That is, until I discovered with the help of my guru that my pre-installed Vista Ultimate put both 32-bit and 64-bit versions on my laptop and set the 32-bit one as default. Unfortunately, the machine is a 64-bit system! Go figure. Yes, the book mentions both versions, but didn't say anything on what is installed by default.

Now although it is true that Vista doesn't come with a printed manual "in the box," it does have a big electronic *Product Guide* as well as a much-improved (vs. Windows XP) built-in/online Help system with illustrations and useful links that is easy to query. (The 315-page Product Guide exists in print form, but

I don't know if Microsoft offers it for sale – I did get a copy as part of the Vista promo campaign.) So, on the question of whether to buy a book, it really gets down to the question of whether (1) you're a do-it-yourselfer and like to learn as you tinker, (2) you don't mind reading electronic manuals, or (3) you're an old-fashioned print-book person (like me) who favors that method of learning and inquiring.

My Bottom Line

I like the book as I have Pogue's previous offerings. It was useful not only for navigating Vista's capabilities, but also as a desktop reference in doing a review of Vista Ultimate. Too bad it wasn't available when I participated in the beta test program! The book could benefit readers more, in my view, if it paid greater attention to the myriad of problems that computerists encounter with a new operating system; hopefully, when the first revision is published?

The price is reasonable at \$35 list less a 35 % computer-clubmember discount and free shipping. So, if you prefer print books over the electronic kind as I do, you probably will enjoy Pogue's latest offering and find it useful in getting up-to-speed quickly and then as a handy reference. Finally, it should be noted that a slimed-down version, Windows Vista for Starters – The Missing Manual, also is available from Pogue-O'Reilly. At \$20 a pop (less 35 %) and 400 pages, it should appeal to new computerists (at least new to Vista) who don't want "the whole nine yards" that is provided in the regular Missing Manual.

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to organize your digital collection by keywords, tags, the date the pictures or video were taken, ratings, and other metadata which makes it significantly more useful.

A new feature, *Shadow Copy*, archives previous versions of your data files for easy recovery in the event that a file is accidentally changed, corrupted, or lost. The copies are automatically saved as part of a restore point in System Properties if *System Protection* is turned on. This is likely to prove a great asset. Another useful addition is the *Snipping Tool*, a big improvement over the *PrtScn* key in allowing you to copy all or part of a screen (free-form, rectangular, or window) and paste it elsewhere in HTML, PRN, GIF, or JPEG format. But, Microsoft has a long way to go before it matches the capabilities of SnagIt!

The Aero Look

The aero look is said to be "modern" – whatever that means. I did find the default's ethereal 3-D look with its translucent glass-like appearance and glass-like menu bars to be pleasing as are the other available desktop wallpapers; but, I don't personally find such features very significant in making a purchasing decision on a new operating system. Appearance per se is less important than usability and function. (I certainly have no issue with the XP desktop look.) That said, the redesigned Start Menu with its Search Box and the Flip 3-D and Flip ways of displaying and quickly accessing open programs on the Desktop along with the Taskbar's scalable "live icons" that are actually miniature pages (instead of generic icons) is pretty cool and more useful too (see samples from Wikipedia below). Screen readability, especially with LCD displays, is better with Microsoft's new Clear Type typefaces, first introduced in XP as an option, but on by default in Vista.

Vista windows and title bars have wider borders, making it easier to grab them for resizing or moving. The Desktop also sports a Sidebar pane located on the right side of the display. It is customizable and contains "Gadgets" (mini-applications) such as news and business data, traffic and weather information, Internet radio streams, calendars & clocks, calculators, games, and whatever. It is useful to a degree and cute, unless you add too much clutter to the desktop. You also can download more from the Internet, if you like that sort of thing. But, the more gadgets you have running, the less memory that is available for other activities.

Vista Help

Although Microsoft doesn't include a printed guide in the Vista box, it does provide a well-illustrated 331-page on-line Product Guide (http://snipurl.com/r3cs) offering a comprehensive overview of the features and functions of Vista with information on its various editions and a comparison with Windows XP. (Microsoft has a print version that I received as part of their promotional/review program, but I don't know if it can be purchased.)



Within Vista there is an easier-to-use and more helpful (compared to XP) electronic Help guide that is nicely written, organized, and illustrated, covering everything from learning about the computer to basics of Vista and troubleshooting problems. It even has links that allow you to post a question or search for answers to queries in appropriate Windows Internet communities. In addition, there is a master web site for help articles, FAQs, blogs, webcasts, and instructions with links to other useful sites that can be helpful. If you bought Vista separately from your PC, Microsoft offers 2 free calls post-installation issues. Then, there is a charge of \$35 "per incident." Hopefully, if you need to call, a Microsoft technician who speaks English clearly will answer rather than an overseas helper with a difficult-to-understand accent.

Vista Security

The software includes Defender (spyware & malware protection) and Windows Firewall, but you will need a 3rd party anti-virus program. There are a number of decent free ones that can be downloaded as well as the usual assortment of programs and suites that you can purchase. The Internet Explorer 7 and Windows Mail utilities include anti-phishing protection. Vista Ultimate also includes *BitLocker Drive Encryption* to protect your data on a partition or whole drive from being accessed by others. While it is nice that Vista emphasizes security more so than in previous operating systems, Microsoft's software inclusions are not necessarily the most robust available. But, so far, they seem to be doing a respectable job in guarding the Acer laptop. Of course using a router with a built-in firewall when connected to the Internet adds another layer of protection to my system.

Some Noteworthy Comments from the Gurus

I have looked at a number of books on Vista and the most ringing praise came from Curt Simmons (*How to Do Everything with Windows Vista*, published by McGraw-Hill/Osborne) who wrote: "In my opinion, Windows Vista is the best operating system Microsoft has produced to date, no matter which version you choose to use." No, he did not say best since the invention of sliced bread!

According to some early testing (PC Magazine 1-30-07 and

PC World Feb. 2007), Vista was generally slower than XP on the same machines, but better at multi-tasking on dual-core PCs. Applications ran slower on 64-bit Vista, but adding RAM helps as does using a fast graphics card with lots of dedicated memory. Gaming and photoprocessor software programs were particularly sensitive in this regard. Some reports noted that the expectations for Vista (most notably graphics and enhanced memory) won't be realized until manufacturers provide drivers optimized to run in Vista on machines having more than 1 MB RAM (but preferably 2 - 4 MB) plus faster graphics cards.

CNET editors rated Vista Ultimate 7.8 (out of 10), but their average user rating (from 185 users) was only 5.6. Although the editors were left with a "Is that all?" feeling (Hey, Microsoft didn't leap-frog the Mac OS X 10.4!), they commented that Windows Vista SP 1, due out sometime before the end of the year, promises to fix what's known to be wrong and should offer a few reasons to switch!

Pricing

The MSRP Full Version/Upgrade prices for the various editions are: Ultimate=\$399/259, Business=\$299/200, Home Premium=\$239/159 and Home Basic=\$199/100. Discounts are widely available on-line and in stores. For example, Costco is selling Vista Business for \$272/182, a modest discount. You may see prices much lower, but watch out for support-less OEM DVDs.

The Bottom Line – Should You Buy Vista.....Now?

If you are considering upgrading an existing desktop or laptop that meets Vista's requirements, the answer is—maybe. While Vista (especially the Home Premium and Ultimate versions) has a lot to offer compared to prior Windows operating systems, it takes a fairly robust computer with lots of resources (such as hard drive space, RAM, fast video card) to allow you to take full advantage of its capabilities. Sure, it has a nice new "Aero" graphical look, better built-in security protection, improved stability, many "user-friendly" features, better organizing and search engines, a built-in Media Center with interconnectability to all the digital entertainment components in your home wherever they are, etc., etc; but, you will have to learn how to use all the modified and new stuff. And that takes time and maybe an additional investment in Vista training or books. Furthermore, and perhaps of more significance, software and hardware manufacturers have a ways to go before appropriate Vista drivers are available for all of their products and of greater importance, their products are designed to take full advantage of Vista's advanced capabilities. Some of your existing programs that run fine in Windows XP may not do so in Vista even with its Compatibility Wizard, and vendors may opt to focus on updates and new versions rather than providing current users with new drivers. Also, as of this writing, advanced components to work with ReadyDrive (such as "hybrid" hard drives with flash memory) are not on the market. And few ReadyBoost-capable GB-size flash drives are available to supplement system RAM and speed system operations. I did get a 2 GB SanDisk Cruzer

Micro in a Microsoft Vista Launch Kit that is ReadyBoost optimized and really works as advertised. (It can be bought on eBay for \$49 + shipping or Best Buy for \$75. It was not available when I visited a local Best Buy store.)

On the other hand (Isn't there always one?), if you bought a new system since Vista's release at the end of January 2007 or are planning to buy one, it most likely has a pre-installed Vista operating system. If you are new to the *wonderful world of computing*, it shouldn't make any difference to learn Vista vs. XP and you can limit purchases of new software to those that are Vista-compatible. If you are a "pre-owned-computer" person, and want to make a change, hopefully, the time and effort spent to develop the necessary expertise for happy computing will be worth the rewards seemingly offered by Microsoft's new and "greatest operating system" now and particularly down the road - with all of its forward-looking features and potential for helping you manage home entertainment as well as many of the tasks in your life. As the *Big Prognosticator*, Bill Gates, is purported to have said: "This is only the beginning!"

Main Meeting Report

The Digital Camera Day ended with a presentation by three of Samy's Cameras staff. Bob Welsh, Pasquale Ferazzoli, and Robert Morrissey discussed professional (i.e. - commercial) still photography, consumer oriented cameras, and upscale digital video cameras, respectively. It was preceded by a special one day digital camera help SIG presided over by the above named gentlemen. A number of club members were able to get answers to some of those perplexing questions that the manuals do a great job of obfuscating.

Professional Cameras

The greatest improvement to professional photography is the workflow improvement. Film photography required shooting the photograph, development of the film, proof-sheets, test printing, reshooting, etc. Digital photography now allows real-time viewing of photographs on monitors and allows instantaneous changes or decision making at photo shoots.

A state of the art digital back (in place of film backs) has thirty nine megapixels for an image, allowing 8"x10" film equivalent resolution (no interpolation). Such a device for a Hasselblad CF-39 can cost \$32,000. The PhaseBack will allow time exposures of up to one-hour. Such a system is capable of program exposure, shutter priority, aperture priority, auto-focus, etc. The Hasselblad H2D-39 camera with the CF-39 digital back runs around \$42,000. With the 80GB tethered hard disk option, you can take over 1500 photos in the loss-less compressed mode at a little over 50MB per shot.

Consumer Oriented Cameras

The age of digital photography is here. Some film manufacturers will no longer develop new film technology. Pro-Am DSLR (digital single lens reflex) cameras have now reached a 16 mega pixels maximum.

Cameras are designed for all kinds of users. Active lifestyle cameras include a waterproof camera good to a water depth of 32 feet; some designed to survive a 5-foot drop.

Some compact cameras are multifunctional. They are capable of capturing still photographs and fair resolution video. These cameras are a compromise and you expect good results from both formats. For best results, buy a camera designed for still photography and a second one for video.

Cameras use image stabilizers to help reduce some types of "apparent movement". Optical image stabilization physically moves part of the lens (or, alternatively, the optical sensor) to counteract the physical motion of the camera. An alternative technique is to use digital image stabilization that attempts to combat camera motion by electronic manipulation of the captured image. Image stabilization is usually turned off when using a tripod.

Image stabilization can be built into the lens or into the camera body. For example, the Sony Alpha 100 has image stabilization built into the camera body so that any attached lens will benefit from the technology.

A fixed focal length lens requires the camera to move closer to the subject to increase the relative size of the subject in the final image; and to move away from the subject to decrease the relative size of the subject in the final image. A zoom lens will provide a limited range of adjustable focal lengths to change the magnification.

Optical zoom means that the lens physically moves the elements of the lens to change the focal length. Digital zoom electronically interpolates the optical image to change the magnification. A significant amount of interpolation will drastically degrade an image.

Optical zoom is the only type to consider when selecting a camera. Besides, magnification by digital interpolation is easily performed with any computer-based image editing software and even by some printers through camera direct printing.

The new Olympus SP-550 UZ was presented as the world's most powerful ultra zoom. The 7.1 megapixel SP-550 UZ.'s new 18x wide-angle super-telephoto zoom lens gets you closer to your subject than any other compact digital camera on the market. Dual Image Stabilization eliminates blur. And with high-speed sequential shooting and new Pre-Capture technology, will capture anything that moves.

With all other factors being equal, the size of the camera's optical sensor affects image quality. Larger sensors can capture more light that allows low light abilities to improve. Low light sensitivity is equalizing among lower end cameras. Pro cameras are best at lower ISO ratings because studios have sufficient modeling lights.

Still camera images can be saved in different formats. A RAW image is simply the unprocessed data that the camera's sensors detect. A computer based image editing software is required to convert a proprietary (ex. - Nikon, Canon, etc.) from RAW format to something more suitable for distribution (ex. - .JPG, TIFF, .PSD, etc.). More common is various qualities of .JPG/.JPEG formats that use image compression to reduce the size of the file at the cost of reduced image quality and data loss.

Improved technology now allows some photographers to use the superfine quality setting (usually high quality .JPG format) instead of .TIFF format.

TIFF is more suitable for editing but requires much more file space than .JPG (and sometimes more than RAW). "A photographer we know..." uses the superfine mode to produce 20x30" prints from wedding photos instead of using RAW.

Video Cameras

Samy's Camera uses an acronym to compare video cameras. CNSB stands

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for Codec, Number of sensors, Size of the sensor, and Bit rate.

The C in CNSB stands for Codec (Compression/Decompression). [I don't believe my notes missed any discussion of Codecs per se, so...] Samy's Camera divides video into two types. The first type is SD (standard definition) that derives from NTSC television. Resolution is 720 left to right by 480 vertical interlaced fields. The second type is HD (high definition). Different manufacturers use their own resolutions (ex. - Sony and Canon use 1440 x 1080). Obviously, this is different from standard 1080i/p (1920 x 1080 or 16x9). HD images capture 4.5 times greater information than SD images.

N in CNSB stands for Number of sensors. A camera using a single sensor must extract RGB from each pixel. Green is accentuated in consumer level cameras. Superior cameras use three sensors to capture RGB. Three sensor cameras cost \$1000 to \$9000.



Above is the new Canon XHA1 3 CCD HD camcorder. A great piece for a mere \$3500.

S in CNSB stands for Size of the sensor. A larger sensor collects more light and is not starved for light. There are four types of sensor sizes: single 1/6", single 1/3", three 1/3", and 2/3" commercial.

B in CNSB stands for Bit rate. A 1/6" single sensor camera uses 8.2 megabits per second. A 1/3" single sensor camera uses 8.2megabits per second (typically a direct to hard drive camera). Robert said the highest quality pro cameras use MiniDVD tapes (a from 1987 technology) because they have 25 megabits per second data transfer capability which is better than the hard disk cameras offer.

This sounded a little odd as for instance, Hitachi's Travelstar 5K120 hard disk drives, operating at a mere 5400 RPM, are specified as having a media transfer rate max. of 510 Mbits/sec. Even subtracting a lot for overhead, that seems like it should be way better than tape. Highest camera quality is 1.485 Gigabits per second with a larger color space.

Sony's top of line (circa 2003), SD (720x480) video, DCR-VX2100 (\$3000 list) is still sought by wedding photographers because it is a low light champion at 1 lux. HDTV cameras are not as good in low light because of the density of the sensors.

HD resolution varies by manufacturer JVC and Panasonic favor 1280 x 720p (progressive scan). Sony and Canon use a higher resolution, but it is interlaced.

8mm and Hi8 tapes use 400 vertical lines of resolution. Not all 8mm tapes use compatible lubrication. Sony 8mm tapes use a wet lubricant. Panasonic 8mm tapes use a dry lubricant. Robert emphasized this advise, DO NOT MIX LUBRICANTS. That means you should pick one BRAND of tape and stay with it! If you don't heed this advice, a messy sludge will result that degrades the quality of your video. You can fix this problem by using a \$25 head cleaner, but using it has a downside. The abrasive nature of the head cleaner will shorten the head life. If you stick with one brand of tape, cleaning is not normally needed.

HD video cameras record video with software programs that use two types of compression. Intraframe compression compares areas within same frame to compress common areas.

Interframe compression compares one frame to the next (and that one to the next and that one to the next...) and produces a delta (changed data) of the two, thus eliminating large areas of duplication. One example given was a fixed camera position recording a car crossing in front of the camera with mountains in the background. It takes 16 frames to record the scene, but the software only records one image of the back ground and 16 small images of the car its different locations.

Computer Aided Investing SIG

Markets: There was a lot to talk about this meeting after a melt down of the markets. There were various signals, but since the up-trend was so strong, many ignored the subtle hints that a major reversal was about to happen. And it was that. All the major indexes dropped below their 50 day MA and looked like they would stay there for a while. We listened to the review of the markets by "Brian Shannon at Alphatrends.blogspot.com who provides a daily audio and visual technical market review. His point was that it is too uncertain to stay in the market for now. A quick look at the Tango5 system showed a sell status - which means don't buy, and hold onto your positions until they hit a stop or RSIStoch level below 30.

The Economic Confidence Model of Martin Armstrong made itself popular this week, since it predicted 2/27/2007 as a catastrophic day in the financial markets. This model developed in the 90's uses an 8.6 year cycle between major market events. It was successful in predicting the 1980 inflation in the late '70s and the crash of 1998 on July 20th, and other key economic and market benchmarks into the 90's and 2000. The next major financial event is forecast for late in 2008. (2008.225). Our straw vote on the markets was bearish. No one expected the markets to rise by next month's meeting.

Investment Topics: Hulbert's Newsletter Reviews. We took a look at the data

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summarized from Hulbert's Newsletter that reviews several hundred newsletters on stocks and mutual funds. It was interesting to see that only a few newsletters had a track record for 10 to 15 years of risk adjusted performance that was better than the overall market (as measured by the Wilshire 5000). These 15-20 newsletter portfolios consistently provided returns between 15 to 25 percent annually. While the positions in these top twenty might leapfrog each other from time to time, it appeared to be a safe bet that they had a scheme that worked and if you had the discipline to follow it, you could do well.

TechSignal.com is the Foundation for the Study of Cycles website and is now offering software that may be purchased for determining market cycles for trading.

Gorilla Trades was reviewed as a method of stock picking. This is a subscription service that provides daily emails of hot stocks to consider trading – if you follow their rules when the stock hits its trigger price or confirmation volume. There is little information about how Gorilla picks the stocks and what their fundamentals are. The stock picks are intended to be hot ones that will rise over the next couple of weeks. Users are given the rules to follow and if the trigger isn't met in 5 days, drop it. For stocks purchased, you track them as they home in on a target price, or get stopped out at a stop loss (provided). If they hit the target, you are supposed to sell 50 – 75% of your position, cashing in before the stock turns around. Most of the profits were shown as 7 - 10% for the stocks that made it to the targets. Statistics were not available for the number sold at the stops. The conclusion was that the system could be helpful and profitable, but it wasn't a system that you could take casually – it took a lot of work every day to monitor all open positions and manage your stops. Portfolios would grow to 50-60 stocks if you held onto partial positions after selling at the first target. It might complement the approach used by Vector Vest for picking stocks, and Vvest might be useful in making more assessment about the stock picks using their RST system.

AmiBroker SIG

We reviewed some highlights of the AmiBroker Houston Conference and the new book being offered by H. Bundy at QuantitativeTradingSystems.com. There is a lot of information about the book at the website, including sample chapters that contain AFL code. The book is not intended as an AFL course, but is geared to design and validation of trading systems using AFL/AmiBroker. From the presentation at the conference, H. Bundy has a lot to offer AB users in terms of his ideas and codes. Some of his code is already available on the above website.

We spent the meeting going over 4 programs – how they worked, how they were coded and how to use them for technical analysis. These programs were uploaded to AFL-Tidbits for users to pick apart and/or put to use. The first program was one to generate the RutVol signal and was an advanced study of how signals were combined to produce an important signal – the same signal used in Tango5. The second program added to the first, a component for portfolio trading using the RutVol signal. This program used a scoring routine to pick funds, etc. using a Bollinger Bands Scoring formula. It produced pretty good results, with a CAR of 26%, MDD of -11% for the 2002 - 2007 period. The last two programs implemented retrieval of fundamental data for Quotes Plus users. The fundamentals2 program is more of a tutorial program that is useful to determine how dependable the various data fields are maintained before you implement screens using them, and the other program is more advanced, implementing a CANSLIM screen that saves the result into a new watchlist - so be careful to set the watchlist in the Param field before running it.

We discussed how the SIG should be run and most felt that they would prefer it to focus on learning AFL and coding, rather that reviewing existing programs, etc. This means users would bring in their laptops to work the example exercises, and lessons would be made available on-line before the meeting, for users to download, study, and prepare questions. So this will be the plan for the next few months. We will use the AFL-Tidbits Board for the lesson plans and Q&A. More information will be published as the lessons are prepared and uploaded.

Hardware SIG Report

April's topic will be a Digital Camera Technology Buying Guide. We'll discuss the criteria that you need to consider before buying a digital camera. Features are important, but you'll have to put all the pieces together before you know which camera will be suitable for your application.

The smallest cameras are highly portable. The surprisingly high count of megapixels in the sensor would have cost thousands of dollars just a few years ago. There are large LCD screens on the back. Why buy anything else?

Bigger is better at least when considering higher quality and performance.

Ultra small cameras are only superior when it comes to portability and small size.

Larger full featured cameras look just like the professional SLRs (single lens reflex) cameras that the pros use. So why don't the pros use them?

Speed and flexibility are limited. An electronic viewfinder doesn't tell the full story. Does it accurately represent the final image? Is it cropped? How much is the lag time for the display? How many times per second is the image updated?

The cameras used by the pros are bigger, heavier, and much more costly. The advantages are numerous including performance, adaptability, quality, versatility, and, most of all, the wow factor. Of course, all of these may be as useful as your Corvette's advantages for getting to work in downtown.

We'll talk more about this and much

more. Bring your digital camera and we can compare what features everyone likes and dislikes.

Computer Security

This month we covered vitalization/sandboxing and the storm trojan horse. We also answered questions about using multiple AntiViruses and password strength.

VM AND SANDBOXING

Just a couple of months ago we covered segmentation (DEP) and now we are covering vitalization which is another big trend in the security world right now.

Using a virtual machine (VM) simply means you have a place set aside where you can safely play around and make mistakes in. The idea is similar to the sandbox many of us used as a kid. Using a VM is sometimes called "sandboxing."

I mentioned that there seemed to be two kinds on the market today. Some will drop your rights so you can't change anything and others will restrict access to that thing so you cant change it.

To me the ones that drop your rights are similar to what you can do with scripts that already exist. Look at Aaron Margosis's BLOG and his program "drop my rights."

The programs that we talked about in detail were: sandboxie, VMWARE player, VIRTUALPC, drop my rights, safezilla

I also mentioned: Bufferzone, QEMU, safelaunch, Greenborder, DefenseWall. Personally I use Sandboxie and VM-

WARE. Both of them are free.

I think VMWARE is trying to do something like Adobe did with PDF files. Adobe created a "player" to read a PDF and they have it away for free but you have to buy another product to create one. VMWARE is doing something similar with VMs. It was about a

year ago that VMWARE released their player. I went to their web site to see what I could play on it. There was only one VM or appliance. It opens FireFox in a Ubuntu (Linux) Operating System. People could then surf the web without messing up anything outside the sandbox. I put a copy of this appliance on the guest account on my desktop computer.

Now there are several hundred appliances from setting-up lesson plans, demonstrations, and kiosks, to firewalls, Internet servers and Intrusion Detection Systems (IDS).

When I want to look at a program and see what it does, I use Sandboxie. It places any files/resources you change into a separate area so your data and the OS is safe. But on my guest account (renamed actually), I have allowed a link to the VMWARE browser appliance.

The is a new Trojan Horse on the scene, "storm trojan horse." Actually it showed up in January but now there is another version. It changes any postings at BLOGS or web-based newsgroups. It adds a link with the caption "look at this funny video". Then anybody tries to click that link they will be infected with several pieces of spyware and keyloggers.

The best way to tell if you are infected is to look at any postings you make and make sure everything happened as you expected.

One audience member wanted to know how to create a strong password and the rest of the group chimed in. We went over the basics of creating a mangled pass phrase and using a password safe.

Then someone asked about using more than one AV. We went over why there was a big debate about this. Some say that redundancy is good and you should have as many as possible. Others (myself included) say that something as low-level as an AV or a firewall will interfere with each other when they are used at the same time.


Parking Information — Chapman University's main parking
